Lethbridge is two hours south of Calgary, Canada's third largest city and a major transportation hub for the region, and one hour from the U.S. border. Lethbridge's location in the heart of southern Alberta also puts it in close proximity to premier attractions like Waterton Lakes National Park, Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump World Heritage Site and Writing-on-Stone Provincial Park. The Oldman River runs through the middle of the city, creating scenic coulees, verdant valley parkland and boundless recreational opportunities.

## Cost of Living

With low housing prices and affordable consumer goods and services, along with Alberta's low tax regime, living in Lethbridge means doing more with your money, while our easy lifestyle means you have more time to enjoy the things that matters most to you.

## Climate

Thanks to its location under the big skies of the prairies, Lethbridge enjoys a climate of mild winters and warm, sun-soaked summers. In fact, Lethbridge is one of the sunniest cities in Canada, with more than 320 days of sunshine every year. In winter, Lethbridge benefits from the Chinook winds that frequently blow off the Rockies and bring with them warm temperatures and melt any snow in their path. Though our semi-arid climate makes us one of the dryer cities in Canada, we get enough moisture to keep the coulees of the Oldman River valley green and maintain a thick and healthy urban forest.

## Housing & Transportation

Whether you want a brand new detached home, an older house near our walkable downtown, or the flexibility of an apartment or condo, finding a home in one of our more than 40 neighbourhoods that suits your lifestyle is within your reach. Getting around is easy as well; traffic is light and a short trip away.
